

MANY CANADIANS DEAD AT DIEPPE ADDED TO LIST

Names of 289 More Sol- diers Who Gave Lives in Monster Raid

HAD BEEN MISSING

Ottawa, Dec. 12.—(CP)—The names of 289 Canadian soldiers have been added to the list of those who were killed in action on the blood-stained beaches of Dieppe or died later from wounds suffered in the monster raid on the French coast town.

Their names were reported in four casualty lists made public yesterday and last night by the Canadian (active) army. They were troops who had been previously reported as missing.

The names of three officers, Capt. Herbert Victor Poag, member of the Central Ontario Regiment; Lieut. William Bryans Goodall and Lieut. Richard Ambrose Wise, both of the Manitoba Regiment, were listed. All three are of Winnipeg.

Majority of the men came from the Central Ontario Regiment, represented at Dieppe by the Royal Regiment of Toronto and the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry, which had 125 men in the four lists. Another 49 of the casualties were from the Western Ontario Regiment, the colours of which were carried into the battle by the Essex Scottish, of Windsor, Ont.

Le Regiment de Quebec, represented by Les Fusiliers Mont-Royal, reported 43 men killed.

Twenty-six of the dead were men of the Saskatchewan Regiment, represented in the fighting by the South Saskatchewan Regiment, of Weyburn, Sask., while another 24 were from the Manitoba Regiment, represented by the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders of Winnipeg. A few armoured corps men, signallers, medical personnel, engineers and divisional troops completed the lists.

Total Dieppe casualties in killed, wounded, missing and prisoners were around 3,350, or 67 per cent. of the raiding force.
