The department which a year ago had a staff of something over 2,700 is now down to a payroll of slightly under 700 and there will be a further substantial cut at the end of this month. Its predecessor, the Wartime Munitions and Supply Department, had a peak payroll of be-

tween 3,000 and 4,000.

The years' reduction in the department, however, does not represent a 2,000 reduction in the civil Housing Program service. The research and development branch, for example, has been taken over by National Research Council virtually intact. The purchasing branch in reduced form has gone to Canadian Commercial Corporation under the Department of Trade and Commerce. On the other hand, two branches working on war contracts have virtually completed their jobs and will wind up during the month.
